## Adverbs vs. Adjectives

### Hint, Hint...

An adjective is a word that describes a noun. For instance, whether something is big or small, brown or yellow, fast or slow. An adverb tells you how, when or where something happens. Many adverbs end in the letters -ly. Sometimes you can turn an adjective into an adverb by adding -ly. Read each sentence below, and circle the adverbs. Underline the adjectives.
