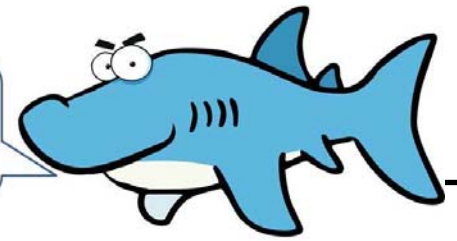

Recognizing Conjunctions

Conjunctions are words that join two or more words, phrases or clauses. Conjunctions can indicate that two phrase or clauses in a sentence are equally important, or they can indicate a relationship between two phrases or clauses having to do with time, cause/effect, condition or contrast.
