

You Get That?

A tag question is a short question at the end of a sentence that asks for confirmation from the listener.

You form a tag question by using a negative question after a positive sentence, or a positive question after a negative sentence.

Form a tag question using the auxiliary verb and pronoun from the sentence.

EXAMPLE: You will be on time, won't you?
You won't forget, will you?
