Plop It In

The words to, too and two are homophones: they are words that sound the same, but have very different meanings.

To is a preposition used to express movement or direction to a point (as to from): *We drove to the mall. I will add my name to the list.*

Too means also, or to a greater degree: *I want to go too. It is too small.*

Two is a number: *I have two dogs.*
